# CAMBOURNE VILLAGE COLLEGE CHARITABLE TRUST

### **Executive Summary**

Cambourne Village College is no ordinary school. In just seven years, since opening in 2013, we have gained an Ofsted Outstanding rating along with designation as both a Leading Edge and Teaching School. Even with the challenges of rapid growth, an increasingly diverse student intake and growing numbers of students with special educational needs, our pupils are flourishing.

We also sit at the heart of one of the fastest growing communities in the UK and from the outset our 'Village College' remit has been central to our ethos. We support an active adult education programme and more than 30 community groups and organisations make use of the school's facilities: the school is bursting at the seams, virtually all year round. This unusual commitment to our local community was a key factor in our winning a prestigious Silver award in the 'Making a Difference' category of the Pearson School of the Year competition 2018.

Not content simply to be a great school, we have two core ambitions:

• To equip our pupils and other young people with the confidence, knowledge and skills they will need to thrive, for life.



• To support and strengthen the cohesion, inclusivity, health and wellbeing of the wider Cambourne community.

Like all Cambridgeshire state schools, Cambourne Village College has seen severe funding cuts in real terms since 2010: this academic year our per-capita pupil funding is just £5,043. Despite these funding constraints and demand for community provision that outstrips our capacity to deliver it, we are already on the way to achieving our core ambitions. However, we know we can do more.

One of the reasons for our success has been an emphasis on providing arts, music and cultural activity at the highest level. There is mounting evidence<sup>1</sup> of the impact of arts and culture on the academic achievement, confidence, motivation and life-and-coping-skills of young people, and of its impact on the health, wealth and wellbeing of communities. The Cambourne community has no arts-related venue and extremely limited access to cultural and leisure activity.

Our goal is to build on our experience of successfully delivering outstanding arts and culture and to transform opportunities for our students and our wider community to see, experience and take part in arts, music and cultural activity of the highest possible quality. To achieve this, we aim to develop a new arts and performance space and secure funding for the appointment of a dedicated Arts Development professional for Cambourne. We cannot achieve this alone and are looking for partners and supporters who share our vision for our young people and our community. With your help we can succeed.

Our project will provide a wonderful new arts venue and will support our work with young people in music and drama, as well as being a community resource. While Cambourne is not an area of deprivation, 31% of our catchment dwellings are social housing and we see ever-increasing levels of need in our incoming cohorts: 61% of our current Year 8 pupils arrived with reading ages below chronological age; we have more than 80 registered Young Carers and the proportion of pupils with Special Education Needs and Disabilities has reached 18% across the whole school. Cambridgeshire has also historically been one of the lowest-funded counties per pupil in the whole of England.

### Context

South Cambridgeshire is an area of rapid population growth. Established in the year 2000, Cambourne comprises 4000 homes. The building of an additional 2400 houses is taking place, and a planning application for a further development of 3500 homes immediately adjacent to Cambourne is under approval. Whilst sporting and leisure amenities are built into these new planning applications, there is no provision for any cultural activity or development. Cambourne itself is an active community and is well served by a forward-thinking town council, yet it has minimal facilities beyond functional amenities, the pub, church and sports centre. There is no venue for arts-related activities. Planning to provide an arts venue for Cambourne, as part of extensive work on a cultural strategy by the South Cambridgeshire District Council in 2012, was abandoned due to budget cuts, as was funding for the position of Arts Development Manager for the area in 2015. Local access and exposure to cultural events, for those unable to access the cultural scene of Cambridge, is almost non-existent.

### The School

Cambourne Village College opened in 2013 with just 132 pupils. The College has expanded rapidly to its current roll of 1180 pupils and despite serious funding challenges, has been highly successful, gaining an Ofsted 'Outstanding' rating and designation as both a Leading Edge and Teaching School, being further invited to become a partner school for teacher training with the University of Cambridge Faculty of Education in 2019. The College has worked with Cambridgeshire County Council to extend to 9 forms of entry from 2019 and is now engaged on a further project with CCC to expand to 11 forms of entry - a roll of 1650 pupils - and a 350-place sixth form on site from 2023. This ongoing development represents a significant vote of confidence from the Local Authority.

From the outset, the College has sought to place itself at the heart of the community and is usually open every evening and on both days at weekends to support an active adult education programme and community access. In normal times, more than 30 community groups and organisations make regular use, out of hours, of the school's facilities. This ambition to live up to our 'Village College' remit was a key factor in our winning a prestigious Silver Award in the 'Making a Difference' category of the Pearson School of the Year competition 2018, a particularly fine achievement for a school only five years old. Endorsements of our work from parents and community groups can be found in the Appendix.

### **Arts Education**



Central to our ethos is the vision of developing excellence in music and the performing arts for Cambourne and beyond, bringing an enriched cultural dimension to the lives of our pupils and to the growing local community. The College has always resisted the state school trend to cut curricular access to creative subjects in response to funding shortages. All our pupils have specialist-taught Art, Music and Drama lessons throughout Years 7, 8 & 9, and take-up of these subjects at GCSE is strong, again bucking the national trend. Learning in these areas is enhanced with an extensive extra-curricular offer including a range of visits, for example, the combined Music and German exchange with our partner school in Bad Hersfeld and the annual Art, Photography & History study visit to Berlin.

Take-up of musical instrument lessons is high, with 186 pupils currently having lessons; those designated 'Disadvantaged' have individual music lessons provided free of charge or at subsidised rates. Currently curtailed by Covid -19 restrictions, more than 120 pupils participated in

music-related clubs over 2019/20. Music lessons are creative and active; all pupils sing and learn to play the keyboard and ukulele, and all have opportunities to perform. The Music Department is usually thronged with pupils before and after school, and at breaktimes.



### **Opportunities for All**

Our Music Department offers the Cambourne Music School to our catchment primary schools, usually providing instrumental teaching, and ensemble and choral activities on three evenings after school to between 60 and 80 primary pupils each week, compensating for the absence of peripatetic music teaching in those schools. A generous donation from the local free newspaper in our opening year funded our first grand piano.

The school orchestra now boasts more than 50 members, from an initial 12 instrumentalists in 2013 (including the recorder!) with the range of instruments expanding year on year, and the jazz band, an exciting new addition, performing a range of traditional and modern pieces. Musical theatre has become a strong tradition in the school: following previous successful productions of the established musicals *Oliver!, Grease* and *We Will Rock You*, inspiring musical adaptations of *Macbeth* and *A Christmas Carol* have been performed over the past years, written and choreographed by the College Music and Drama departments. *Guys & Dolls* was our highly successful 2020 production.

Many theatre visits and activities support the Drama curriculum; two Year 8 pupils won their class in the most recent regional final of the English-Speaking Union Performing Shakespeare Competition (more commonly the domain of the independent school sector), going on to perform in the West End finals and being pronounced 'excellent ambassadors of the school' by the judges.

### **Proposal - Our Project**

Our determination to provide cultural enrichment to the lives of our pupils extends to our local community. From the outset, the College collaborated with the Cambourne Parish Council to use S106 funding (the property developers' mandatory contribution to fund local amenities) to equip the small school dining hall with professional-quality sound and lighting systems. These facilities are well used by the school and by local stage and dance groups to host small-scale performances. However, as part of the school's expansion, a much more ambitious, collaborative project to build a professional-quality performance venue on the school site was conceived, and the first phase of construction completed in 2017.

This building was made possible with the support of both Cambourne Parish (now Town) and Cambridgeshire County Councils. State-funded schools cannot borrow money; however, Cambourne Parish Council designated a further £400,000 of future S106 funding to enable the construction of Phase 1 of the project, and this was forward-funded by Cambridgeshire County Council. As yet a very basic space, the new hall



nevertheless contains the acoustic panelling and infrastructure to support the installation of high- quality performance facilities. Support from the Cam Academy Trust and generous grants of £100,000 from the Wolfson Foundation, £15,000 from Trinity College Cambridge and a pledge of £30,000 from the Garfield Weston Foundation have launched our fund raising.

### **Our Vision**

Once equipped, the performance space will provide a cultural base for Cambourne and the surrounding area, enhancing the College's creative and performing arts offer through provision of additional specialist teaching space and high-quality performance facilities for hire by professional and local groups. The facility will allow us to offer larger-scale performances to benefit our catchment primary schools, with whom we work closely, and enable collaborative ventures with our partner schools within the Cam Academy Trust. The impact on all our students' aspirations, confidence and skills development will be significant and the number of local people involved in arts-related activity will increase.

The most recent Cambourne Parish Plan (2017) highlights dissatisfaction with entertainment and leisure activity, with nearly 70% of community contributors either dissatisfied or very dissatisfied with evening and weekend provision. The consultation summary reports: '*The general feeling was that there are very limited options and people have to leave Cambourne to find things to do both during the week and the weekend. The most popular requests were for a cinema, bowling alley, theatre, cultural and music events.*' Just under half of the 2,217 responses received (representing 56% of all households) selected *Cinema* under the 'Additional Social Facilities Wanted' section of the survey.

With our new arts and performance space, Cambourne Village College can begin to address these needs, working with the Town Council to provide a venue for local cinema on the model of the highly successful Saffron Screen venture, based at Saffron Walden County High School. In addition, we aim to recreate the role of the Arts Development Officer for Cambourne, with the remit of coordinating cultural arts events for the community, including the satellite-streaming of professional theatre, opera and dance performances. Once established, the programme will be self-sustaining, funded in large part by popular cinema revenue.





### What it will take to achieve these ambitions

The project to equip the new hall has been sub-divided into three phases: details on next page. The Cam Academy Trust has sponsored Phase 2, the tiered seating and mezzanine director's gallery, to be installed later this academic year. We now seek to raise funds for Phase 3 of the project, the performance area, for completion at the same time.

The Cambourne Village College Charitable Trust was established to accomplish this project and we are seeking sponsors and supporters who share our vision of enhancing the cultural lives of our pupils and of our community.
