



Why is reading so important?

- Reading for pleasure are likely to do better in Maths and English (Institute of Education, 2013).
- Reading for pleasure between the ages of 10-16 had a substantive influence on cognitive process across vocabulary, maths and spelling. (Sullivan and Brown, 2013)
- Reading for pleasure is a "more important determinant of children's educational success than their family's socio-economic status" (Education Standards Research Team, 2012)
- Clark and Rumbold (2006) found that reading is linked to:
 - Increases in general knowledge
 - Understanding of other cultures
 - Community participation
 - Insight into human nature and decision making
 - Additionally, they found that reading events were linked to enhanced social skills and decreased loneliness.
- Mol and Jolles (2014) found that those who read for pleasure reported increased imaginational imagery.



What's important?

- Adequate access to books
- Parents taking a proactive role
- Teachers providing guidance
