GERMAN EXCHANGE

All 24 students (including 17 funded through the Turing Scheme) have returned from an unforgettable few days in Germany, where they deepened cross-cultural connections and embraced the theme of identity and culture through a range of collaborative experiences with our partner school in Viersen.

Day 1: After an early start, we arrived safely in Cologne and were warmly welcomed by our hosts. Students quickly immersed themselves in the experience enjoying a classic Currywurst lunch, engaging in icebreaker activities, and taking part in a German culture carousel that offered insights into everyday life in Germany and the surrounding region.

Day 2: The day centred on exploring identity and culture. Working side by side with their German peers, students created a vibrant mix of presentations, artwork, poetry, and music that celebrated the rich diversity within both of our schools. We were blown away by their creativity!

Day 3: We spent the day in the heart of Cologne, exploring the awe-inspiring cathedral before heading to the Lindt Chocolate Museum. Students learned about the chocolate-making process—and thoroughly enjoyed the free samples!

Day 4: The morning was all about sharing. Students presented their collaborative projects with confidence and pride. They also got to enjoy a typical German Senior Year Leavers Day, including fantastic performances from older students.

Later, we explored Düsseldorf, climbing the iconic Rheinturm for panoramic views of the city—a perfect way to round off the trip.

Saying goodbye to our German partners was emotional, but we're so proud of the friendships formed and the memories made. This visit was not only an educational experience—it was a meaningful opportunity for students to grow, connect, and celebrate global citizenship.

A huge congratulations to Ikram on this outstanding success!







ART/PHOTOGRAPHY PRIVATE VIEW




Summer Reading Passport: Students in Years 6–9 are invited to join this fun reading challenge to stay engaged over the break. Your encouragement at home makes a big difference!

Carnegie Winner: Glasgow Boys - By Margaret McDonald

Neither Finlay or Banjo can remember the last time they had a hug. Against all odds, 18-year-old Finlay has begun his nursing degree at Glasgow University. But coming straight from the care system means he has no support network. How can he write essays, focus on his nursing placement and stop himself from falling in love when he's struggling to even feed himself? Meanwhile, 17-year-old Banjo is trying to settle into his new foster family and finish high school, desperate to hold down his job and the people it contains. But his anger and fear keep boiling over, threatening his already uncertain future. Underpinning everything is what happened three years ago in their group care home, when Finlay and Banjo were as close as brothers until they stopped speaking. If these boys want to keep hold of the people they love, they have to be able to forgive one another. More than this, they must find a way to forgive themselves.
















E-Scooters

S94 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 provides the authority to confiscate property as a lawful disciplinary penalty.

This allows Schools to be more proactive in tackling the issue of E-Scooters being ridden to school.

Main points for this are:

- → School can confiscate a pupil's property as a disciplinary sanction.
- → The confiscation must be reasonable.

Retention and disposal of the property must be reasonable – i.e. return to parents, not the student.

We understand that buying an e-scooter can be tempting, especially as you can get them from many popular retailers.

However, the current law is clear

You can buy one but you can't ride it on a UK public road, cycle lane or pavement. The only place an e-scooter can be used is on private land.

Why is this?

E-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs), so they are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements.

What happens if I've been stopped by Police?

The Police will advise you of the current law about how to use an e-scooter legally and ask you to take your e-scooter home. They may however still penalise you depending on the nature and gravity of the offence.

We understand the public's support for environmentally friendly modes of transport. We want to work with the public to make sure the roads are safe for everyone.

The UK Government is currently taking part in 'Future Transport Zone' trials for e-scooter hire, with a view to making them legal to use on the roads.

PSYCHOLOGY TRIP

This month, our Year 12 Psychology students took their classroom learning to the next level with an inspiring trip to the Freud Museum in London. Having recently studied Sigmund Freud's landmark case studies and psychoanalytic theories, students were able to deepen their understanding by exploring the very home where Freud lived and worked after fleeing Nazi-occupied Vienna.

The visit offered a rare opportunity to see Freud's famous psychoanalytic couch—a symbol of his groundbreaking approach to therapy—and explore



the historic setting that shaped modern psychology. Students also attended an engaging lecture delivered by an expert in the field, which explored the surprising connections between Freud's psychological theories and the practice of archaeology—a nod to Freud's own fascination with uncovering the layers of the human mind, much like excavating the past.

Our students showed remarkable curiosity and enthusiasm, asking thought-provoking questions and demonstrating their eagerness to engage beyond the A-level syllabus. It was a memorable and enriching experience that brought theory to life and encouraged deeper reflection on the legacy of one of psychology's most influential figures.
