TAMMY



Tammy is a 13-year-old girl who loves sports, but life hasn't been easy; she's come a long way to get to where she is today.

Tammy was diagnosed with cerebral palsy at around nine months old, which resulted in her becoming a wheelchair user. She has faced many barriers, setbacks, and challenges throughout her young life, but has courageously overcome them.

When Tammy attended primary school, she was rarely included in PE. While other children were outside taking part in sports, Tammy often found herself inside doing physiotherapy, playing small games, or even making sandwiches.

During annual sports days, Tammy had to complete every activity in her wheelchair, limiting how fully she could take part. Her mum, Lynn, was determined that she should be included as much

as possible. Lynn would lift Tammy out of her chair so she could run the races alongside the other children. Tammy's smile was infectious, and parents cheered from the sidelines.

One year, however, a member of staff told Lynn she wasn't allowed to assist Tammy. After being told she was "causing a scene," Lynn addressed the parents and apologised—only for them to show their full support. She helped Tammy run the race again, and the parents cheered even louder.

The story reached national news, resonating with many families facing similar challenges.




A film crew supported by the Paralympics later approached the family to take part in a documentary called Equal Play, shown on Channel 4. This gave Tammy an eye-opening introduction to the world of disability sport. She was able to try wheelchair racing alongside Paralympian Hannah Cockroft CBE, now a nine-time gold medallist. Tammy's smile returned—along with a powerful sense of freedom and inclusion. She has also met Paralympian Abby Breakwell to try wheelchair tennis at Loughborough University.

Tammy has spoken openly about the challenges of being disabled and excluded from sports on podcasts, news channels, and in various interviews. She even travelled to Paris for the 2024 Paralympics. With the support of the Paralympic movement, she is determined to improve access to sport for disabled children.

Tammy now continues with wheelchair racing and wheelchair tennis, and recently won the Junior Disability Sports Personality of the Year award.


As Tammy likes to say: "No child should be left out—just think outside the box, include everyone."



COOKING WITH TEAM INNOVATE





Year 10 pupils recently took part in two inspirational cooking classes with Chef Rob and Chef Tracy from Team Innovate at Cambourne VC.

In their first lesson, pupils learned how to debone a whole chicken from scratch! They then breaded their chicken breasts and cooked them with a homemade Katsu sauce served with rice. Pupils focused on presentation and even got to taste their culinary creations!

In the second lesson, pupils used chicken drumsticks and wings to create a spicy marinade, which was cooked and added to a vibrant bowl of ramen. Chef Rob and Chef Tracy even transformed the chicken carcasses from the first

lesson into a delicious stock that formed the base of the ramen dish! Pupils enjoyed experimenting with new ingredients such as chilli oil and soy eggs to complete their colourful, flavour-packed ramen bowls.

A massive thank you to Rob and Tracy from Innovate for hosting two brilliant sessions with our Year 10 classes. The pupils were truly inspired and learned a key skill—how to debone a chicken!









SILVERSTONE

THE CONTRACTOR OF THE CONTRACT

Our engineering students recently enjoyed an exciting and inspiring day at Silverstone. The visit began with a STEM workshop in the Learning Studio overlooking the circuit, where students explored real motorsport materials, learned about design and engineering processes, and even handled an authentic F1 steering wheel. They also had the chance to see items such as Romain Grosjean's race suit and Lance Stroll's gloves and shoes up close.

Next, we headed out on a guided tour, walking part of the original Silverstone Circuit and taking in views of the modern track. We were lucky enough to catch some live testing—including a top-secret session that may or may not have featured future F1 stars!

Students then moved on to the Main Exhibition, discovering the history of Silverstone and the evolution of motorsport engineering, mechanics, safety, and technology. They also viewed genuine raced vehicles driven by icons such as Lewis Hamilton, Lando Norris, and many others.





We wish everyone a bookish Christmas and a wonderful reading New Year!








MISTLETOE AND MURDER BY - By Robin Stevens

It is 1939. Nazi Germany. The country is holding its breath. Death has never been busier and will be busier still.





Awards 2026

Financial Awards for Students in Cambridgeshire

Students from <u>all</u> Cambridgeshire secondary schools are entitled to apply for **projects with purpose**. Awards are made once a year and traditionally, projects funded have involved travel of some kind but the Trust also considers applications from young people for projects which are 'home-based'.

This is open to all students in Years 9, 10, 11 and Sixth Form and students can apply to the Trust for an award on their own, with a friend or in a small group. They must, however, have planned their project themself, and any parent/guardian involvement must be in a 'care/protection' role only. If a student is applying as part of a small group, every person in the group must submit an application form.

The deadline for the next round of applications is Saturday 31st January 2026.

Students will be interviewed at Queens' College on **Saturday 14th March 2026.** (Financial support is also available for travel to the interviews).

Who was Henry Morris?

Henry Morris (1889-1961) was the Chief Education Officer in Cambridgeshire for over 30 years from 1922. In 1924 he wrote the now famous Memorandum which led to the founding of the Village Colleges. The movement seeded a change towards "community education" in many parts of Britain and abroad. This change was based on the belief that education should be a lifelong process. He called it "raising the school-leaving age to 90".

The first four village colleges were opened before the war and therefore served as examples for the process of educational reconstruction which took place during and after it. The buildings were to serve the whole community – not just the children. The idea of village colleges grew out of a radical, liberal, paternalistic tradition and it would provide for and meet the community's physical, educational, cultural and recreational needs.

When Henry Morris died in 1961, a group of his friends decided to remember him in a way that would have been dear to his heart. They established a fund that could be used to enable young people to experience the joy and excitement of independent travel and study, and thereby be refreshed and inspired.
