INTRODUCTION

Shout Out UK is a multi-award winning independent news and media network that, via films, journalism, events and education, aims to show young people that political and social issues have a direct impact on their lives. The Political Literacy Course aims to help young people engage with politics, by teaching them about the processes in Politics, as well as public speaking and debating. The skills learnt on the course enhance a student's self-image, confidence, emotional resilience and knowledge of politics.

Is there a need? Young people are the least likely to engage in politics, be it directly or via discussion. We believe this is because of a profound lack of political education in schools. Politics is the one thing that allows us to be who we want to be, gives us a voice and creates a democratic society; yet we give it no time in schools. Our Political Literacy Course gives the next generation a clear understanding of what politics is, how our society works and teaches skills related to politics (debating, public speaking and campaigning), which are relevant and important for anyone's employment opportunities, self-esteem, confidence and resilience.









WHAT STUDENTS GET

After the six week course, successful students will gain a Level 3 award from AQA, which is internationally recognised and highly valued by both employers and higher education institutions.

The top two students will be asked to represent their school at our annual debate in Parliament, entitled The Grand Debate.

UNIT BREAKDOWN AND WHAT WILL BE COVERED

UNIT 1: WEEKS 1-2 (2 HOURS PER WEEK)

What is Politics? The history of politics up to the present day. The student will also gather an understanding of the importance of voting and the process in which to do so. As well as the constitution of the British Parliament, including the House of Lords and House of Commons. What are the local wards, UK constituencies and EU constituency boundaries.

UNIT 2: WEEKS 3-4 (2 HOURS PER WEEK)

Britain and the International Community. What is the EU and UN? The Student will also gain understanding of international trade and economic co-operation. Plus an understanding of Corporate Politics, showing that politics has a direct impact on everyone's life, be it directly or more indirectly.

UNIT 3: WEEKS 5-6 (2 HOURS PER WEEK)

How to campaign for a cause, debate and speak in front of a crowd. The variety of employability routes available in the political industry from MPs offices, lobby groups, charities and political news desks.



ASSESSMENTS

Each unit will be assessed in accordance with AQA regulation. All units have written assignments and the course will end with a verbal examination.

EMPLOYABILITY

Even though not all students will want to go into politics as a career choice, the Political Literacy Course will give students the people skills required in any industry as the six week course will include: debating, speech writing and presentation skills.

VISITING PARLIAMENT

Due to our contacts and partners in Parliament we will be organising a tour in Parliament to students of the completed course for them to see the building 'where it all happens'. This is organised with the Parliament Education Service.

UNIT TITLE: SHOUT OUT UK (UNIT 1) INTRODUCTION TO POLITICS

CURRICULUM AREA(S): POLITICS

UNIT DESCRIPTION

The student will learn through discussions, research and talks on the history of politics to present day. The student will also gather an understanding of the importance of voting and the process in which to do so. This will be learnt through discussions with those who have experienced the process and research.

Understanding politics is part of being an active and engaged citizen - a civic responsibility - and this course will give you the tools necessary to understand and engage in politics.

CURRICULUM AREA(S): POLITICS, BUSINESS STUDIES

UNIT DESCRIPTION

Britain and the International Community. What is the EU and UN? The student will also gain an understanding of international trade and economic co-operation. Plus an understanding of corporate politics, showing that politics has a direct impact on everyone's life, be it directly or indirectly.

THE GRAND DEBATE

At the end of each six week course the top two students from each school taking part in the course that year will take part in The Grand Debate.

The Topic

The topic will be chosen from what has been in the news during the run up to the debate.

Debate Structure

The Grand Debate will take the form on a traditional professional debate with a motion and a for and against team comprised of students.

How will the victor be chosen?

The students not representing the school will be asked to compose the jury who will vote on a possible winner. The chair will have final say.

The Chair

The chair holding the debate will be a national politician or journalist to ensure a level of realism in the debate.

The Venue

Shout Out UK has a vast network of MPs and Lords, who is in regular contact with and will aim to secure a venue in parliament for the Grand Debate as a first choice each year.



AQA AWARD FOR THE COURSE



At the end of the course, all successful students will receive an AQA Level 3 Unit Award Statement for each successfully completed units.

About the Award

The award is a level 3 Award Statement provided by AQA. The levels are based on the QCF level descriptors, placing level three around AS/A-Level, level two around GCSE level. It can be added to a student's CV, it is internationally recognised and highly valued by both employers and higher education institutions.

The award statement will be given to all students who successfully complete the six week course, while the top two students will be asked to represent their school at our annual Debate in Parliament, entitled The Grand Debate.

About AQA

AQA is an independent education charity and the largest provider of academic awards taught in schools and colleges. AQA set and mark the papers for around half of all GCSEs and A-levels taken every year.

Our previous work includes 'Anonymous: A Million Men' which was subsequently sold to Shorts International Ltd for international distribution. The film is now available on iTunes, Amazon Video and Google Play.

Moreover, on the 28th April 2015, Shout Out UK collaborated with Channel 4 and ITN to launch Britain's first ever Youth Leaders' Debate. The programme aired at 8pm GMT and after 10min the #YouthLeaders was trending on Twitter (UK).

Event Planning

We run events on a variety of issues; and in many different forms. Our flexible and creative nature allows us to turn even the most grey of issues interesting, entertaining and accessible to young people. I am definitely more interested in politics as a result of this course.
