Why did you opt to do this subject?

What do you do in lessons? Describe a typical lesson or classwork activity.

• Write down new vocabulary that we then use to create sentences, answer questions and respond to listening tasks. Sometimes we use sites like Gimkit and Ouizlet.

 Usually in lessons we begin by going over previous vocabulary that we have learned to make sure to consolidate our knowledge. Then, we do many different listening and reading activities to assist with learning new vocabulary and gain confidence in reading Spanish. What I really enjoy is that Spanish allows you to experience many different types of learning: from having a conversation with Spanish questions, to doing gap fills from listening to Spanish songs.

What type of things do you do as homework?

- Learning vocabulary, practising grammar, listening activities or creating detailed responses to certain topics
- We usually get set 1 piece of homework a week which consists of a short writing task or revising for a vocabulary test. These really assist you in making sure what was taught in the lesson you remember and are able to write confidently about the module taught.

How are you assessed/tested?

- Via simple listening and writing tests as well as longer practice papers
- Towards the end of each half term you would take short assessments in reading, listening, speaking and writing. These assist both you and the teachers with finding gaps in your knowledge and being able to practice some more exam technique. Teachers will then work on the areas that the class struggles in so you can improve and perform better in the next assessment.
